

We operate in six fields in three counties — Kern, Fresno, and Monterey — that produce crude oil and natural gas, as well as electricity and steam. With thousands of productive wells, we are one of the largest oil producers in the state.



We use ingenuity to solve today's complex energy challenges and power progress in Central California. As part of our commitment, we operate our fields responsibly and strive to minimize environmental impacts.

Affordable, reliable, ever-cleaner energy is essential to achieving a more prosperous world. Our strategy is clear – leverage our strengths to safely deliver lower carbon energy to a growing world. Here are just some of the initiatives we're working on to lower the carbon intensity of our operations.



We're planning to utilize carbon capture and storage (CCS) technology at our Eastridge facility in Kern County. CSS is the process of capturing carbon dioxide (CO2), either to prevent it from entering the atmosphere or to directly remove it from the atmosphere, and safely and securely store that CO2 thousands of feet below the surface.



Renewable natural gas is derived from biogas, which is produced from organic waste and processed for future use. In partnership with California Bioenergy and dairy farmers, we are producing renewable natural gas from dairy biomethane.



We aim to deliver lower carbon energy to a growing world by creating a profitable, large-scale, lower carbon hydrogen business that builds on our existing assets, capabilities and customers. We believe we are well positioned to supply hydrogen to industrial, power and heavy-duty transportation customers.



Utilizing renewable energy to power our operations and lower our carbon intensity with California sunshine. Chevron and SunPower developed a 29-megawatt solar field at our Lost Hills oil field in Kern County, which began delivering electricity to our operations in April 2020. The plant supplies approximately 80% of the Lost Hill oil field's annual energy demand. "Energy powers the world. The question is how do we continue to supply this energy in an affordable, reliable and ever-cleaner manner. We need to work together today to lower the carbon intensity of the forms of energy that will be needed for decades."

eastridge CCS project

Chevron aims to reduce the carbon intensity of our operations in San Joaquin Valley, California by capturing CO2 and safely storing the emissions underground, thousands of feet below the surface.

This initiative is planned at our Eastridge facility, located within Chevron's Kern County operations. The Eastridge CCS project will entail installing CO2 post-combustion capture equipment, compressing the CO2 and then injecting the CO2 into the subsurface for permanent storage.

our opportunity

According to United Nations climate change scientists achieving net zero emissions by 2050 is not possible without scaled deployment of carbon capture, utilization, and storage (CCUS) and other carbon dioxide removal technologies. Experts see CCUS as an essential tool in mitigating greenhouse gas emissions and meeting the Paris Agreement goals.

safe and effective CO2 injection and storage

Chevron has decades of operational experience, a proven track record of carbon capture projects and is already deploying carbon capture and storage technologies in locations across the globe.

providing a reliable water source for agriculture


Oil production also produces water. For each barrel of oil recovered in California, there are also approximately 15 barrels of water produced, commonly referred to as "produced water."

A small portion of produced water is filtered, processed and then provided to agricultural water districts. These districts then blend the water with other surface and groundwater before providing it to farmers for use as irrigation water.

Water produced by oil production is a reliable source for agriculture especially during times of drought. Produced water supplied for agriculture reduces the need to use other water supplies.

We provide more than 6.2 billion gallons, or more than 19,000 acre feet, of water annually to the Cawelo Water District. This benefits local farmers on approximately 34,000 acres of central valley farmland.



- Our Central California operations are based in Bakersfield and employ more than 800 workers in Kern County. Kern County is also home to our Heavy Oil Center, a world-class research and training facility for employees and partners across the world.


